What you **believe**


determines what you do, your view of reality, how you make sense of **life** and the **world**.

2.2 Bagel Choices

Imagine you walk into a room where your host has put out a sumptuous spread of assorted bagels and shmears. Let's walk through your possible decision making process, the choices you will need to make if you are going to eat a bagel.

First off, you will need to find out or **DISCOVER** there are bagels in the room. How would you do this?

You could stumble across them, smell them or see them, or you could see other people hanging around them and go over to see what is going on.

Or, if you are not too inquisitive, distracted, on the phone, or whatever, and end up sitting down without a bit of interest in the bagels, someone will have to come and tell you about them.



At this point, whether you realize it or not, your brain will run through the questions and choices below.

- **Investigation:** Do I go over to the bagels or not?
- **Interest:** Do I want to have a bagel?
- **Selection:** What kind of bagel?
- **Size:** Do I want the whole bagel, or just half the bagel (and should I come back later and eat the other half?)
- **Prep:** Do I cut it in half, or eat it whole, do I toast it or not?
- **Enhancement:** What should I put on it? Cream cheese, peanut butter, butter, jam, all of the above?
- **Presentation:** After all this, I have a beautifully prepared bagel. I can put it on a plate for all to see and admire and take a picture of it.
- Action: Finally, I must decide to take a bite.

Who knew there was so much involved in bagel prep and consumption. Choices are made all along the way. We do this hundreds of times a day without even thinking about it.



The One & Only

- **1.** Yahweh (I AM WHO I AM) is the sacred, personal name of Israel's God eventually spoken aloud only by priests in the temple. After the temple was destroyed in AD 70 the name was not pronounced. It portrays the sense that God is self existent and always present with his people. In the Middle Ages the name was translated Jehovah and now appears in our Bibles as LORD, as opposed to Lord which is used for the name *Adonay*. ¹
- 2. Novation "God has no origin." ²
- **3. A. W. Tozer** "For God is everywhere while He is nowhere, for "where" has to do with matter and space, and God is independent of both. He is unaffected by time or motion, is wholly self-dependent and owes nothing to the world His hands have made." ³
- **4.** Only God can trust in Himself all other beings must trust in Him. All things need God. Only to God is nothing necessary. This allows Him to be limited by nothing, truly free and independent.
- **5.** There are no parts to God. He is only composed of himself, the ultimate in simplicity and perfection.
- **6.** God has no needs. He does not need our help, support or defense.
- **7.** Arthur W. Pink "He is solitary in his majesty, unique in his excellency, peerless in his perfections. He sustains all, but is himself independent of all. He gives to all, but is enriched by none." ⁴
- **8. A. W. Tozer** "So, were every man on earth to become an atheist, it could not affect God in any way. He is what He is in Himself without regard for any other." ⁵
- **9.** Norman L. Geisler "God is by nature an absolutely Necessary being. That is, He cannot not exist." God is Being. Everything else only has being because it has been given to them by God." ⁶
- **10. God is the original, uncaused cause of everything.** He is not derived from anything. He is and will ever be, independent of you and me.

2.3 Ultimate Q & A

We are all looking for answers. Whether we realize it or not, in order to **survive** we develop a **framework** from which we **make sense** of life and the world. We draw our personal meaning and values from it, it controls the way we think and ultimately live our lives. It determines what we care about:

- The **risks** we take and the **choices** we make
- How we treat people and view history
- How we engage **culture**
- What we **settle for** and what we **fight for**
- The relationships we make and the relationships we break

This framework is called our **Worldview** and provides the desperately needed answers to those unsettling, tension causing questions. **Questions** asked by mankind from the beginning of time, **planted in our hearts** by God, to draw us back to Him.

Questions about:

- Creation: Who Am I? Where do I come from?
- Meaning: Why am I here? What is my Purpose? Where am I going? Where should I be going? Can I make an impact?
- Morals and Ethics: What is good, valuable, beautiful? How do I treat others, live in community? Who's in charge?
- Afterlife: What happens after I die? Is there some kind of reckoning? Am I responsible for my life's impact?
- **Hope:** What will the future bring? What about destiny, progress, can I make an impact for good? Will things get better?
- Truth: What is real? What can I trust?
- Evil: How do I explain evil, sin?
- God: Is there a God and what is He like?

Timeless questions about God, origins, evil, human nature, values, destiny and truth, beauty, change, progress, life, love, purpose, eternity.....

These rise up from deep within our souls – We want to trust, we want to be loved, we want to have purpose.

Is there anything worth living for?
Who can I trust?
Does anyone care?
Does anyone care about me?

practice Prayer and Fasting



Prayer - Talking with God

Much has been written on prayer, Jesus spent much of His earthly life practicing it, it was the only thing the disciples ever asked Jesus to teach them, and it is one of the earliest things we learn how to do as we say our prayers before bed as children.

Unfortunately, we spend much more time talking about it, sharing requests, studying it, and making up rules about it, than we actually do it. That is, until we are flat on our backs in a hospital bed, the bank account is empty, our spouse has left, our children are in jail, or our job has been eliminated. Then we pray! **Let's not wait until the disasters happen**.

When asked to **share requests**, we talk about Aunt Susie's big toe, our fourth cousin who is traveling, and the test our neighbors child is taking tomorrow.....all valid requests, but really, what about our needs? Don't we have any? Of course we do.....we either don't recognize them, or we are ashamed to share them or for some reason we think it is selfish to pray for our own needs.

Prayer is a practice of engagement – moment by moment communicating with God. It strengthens our spiritual life and can easily be combined with the practices of Solitude and Silence. It **changes things on earth** to be as in heaven. It has power and for us to practice it is to engage the power of God.

For additional background on the practice element, see the appendix.

So here is the challenge for this unit – let's start with developing a daily practice of personal prayer.

- 1. Pick a time and place to be alone and pray for at least 10 minutes each day. Use your MasterList (see below) to remind you how to pray. If you miss this appointment, use the last few minutes before your drift off to sleep to talk to God.
- 2. This practice should become an integral part of your daily routine; keep your running conversation going with God all day.
- 3. Once weekly combine your prayer time with a time of Solitude and Silence.
- 4. You can pray silently, aloud or write down your prayers.
- 5. You can pray anywhere, anytime, in any posture and as long as you need.
- 6. Prayer should be addressed to the Father in the name of Jesus, who has granted us access.
- 7. Attitudes of prayer include persistence, watchfulness, humility, sincerity and honesty.
- 8. There is no place in true prayer for indifferent, habitual ritual.

- 9. What should you pray for?
 - For yourself, for others, for your enemies
 - For wisdom, direction, peace, courage, strength, obedience
 - For the government, the cities, the churches
 - For the poor, the sick, the prisoners, the persecuted,
 - For God's purposes to be accomplished
 - For physical, material, spiritual needs
 - For protection from evil and spiritual power
 - For guidance, forgiveness and cleansing
 - Thanksgiving and praise for who HE is and how He cares for you.
 - Thanksgiving and praise for his answers to prayer

Creating the Prayer MasterList

- 1. After years of trying to keep track of various prayer lists for different groups to no avail, and using an assortment of different kinds of prayer journals with special paper, columns, etc., I decided to make my own, very simple prayer MasterList.
- 2. I recommend using a small journal, that you can keep with you, or create a space on your laptop or your phone to make the entries.
- 3. There are also APPs for smart phones and tablets that allow you to create digital prayer lists.
- 4. Every prayer request is logged in some way on this list. I don't go into great detail, as I have found the Holy Spirit always brings back to mind why I am supposed to pray.
- 5. Items on the list are usually either just names, or 3 to 4 word explanations.

Set up your Sections: Think about the different categories of people and things you pray for before setting up your different sections. Here are the sections I use:

- General Ongoing requests: These are things that I want to continue to pray for
- In the News: related to world and national events, leaders, natural disasters, etc.
- Friends and Family: Close friends and extended family members by name
- Christian Workers and Ministries: By name
- Salvation/Christian Growth: People without Christ or walking without Christ.
- **Illness:** Those who are sick
- **Tough Stuff:** Those going through struggles, use only first name if confidential.
- Specific Requests: Specific requests for something that has an end date
- **Section for myself:** General and specific, spiritual and material
- Section for each family member: General and specific, spiritual and material

Label your Sections and Enter Requests: I label the top of the page with the section title. Make sure to leave some blank pages in between and then label the top of the next section. You can put tabs on the pages if you wish. Enter names and requests under each section.

Record Answers: When a prayer is answered I just put a star by the line. Many of the things I pray for are ongoing so I never stop praying for anyone on the list until they die.

Personal Reflections on Prayer:

- 1. Prayer is a practice of engagement which means we are to do something we normally would not do. Many times prayer is seen as a last resort, something to do when there is nothing else to do. What kinds of things do you find yourself doing first, before you finally pray about a situation?
- 2. What excuses or rationalizations do you come up with to put it off prayer or not do it at all?
- 3. What kinds of things do you immediately pray about? What kinds of things do you rarely consider praying about?
- 4. List some of the ways prayer changes your perspective or outlook.
- 5. Explain what you experience when others pray for you.



- 6. When others ask you to pray for them, what are you going to do?
- 7. Share how you could personally pray about everything as you go throughout your day.

Fasting - Depending on God

Fasting is often **done in combination with focused prayer** for a specific need or action, or for seeking God's guidance. It is the most obvious **practice of abstinence**, since it requires the cessation of eating or drinking for a period of time to allow us to focus our **dependence on God** and **His ability to satisfy** all our needs.

It teaches us temperance, self control, moderation and restraint, as well as humility. It goes beyond skipping a meal. We need to **commit in advance** to a period of fasting, and then pray through it as we go about our day. The struggle that ensues, the hunger pangs, reveal much about what we depend upon, and remind us to pray.



No matter what, during my fasting experiences, **I am always hungry**, even though I probably would not have been under normal circumstances. There is no reason most of us could not go 24 hours without food.

Take the fasting challenge and see what God reveals to you.

- 1. Fasting usually pertains to abstaining from food and drink for a time, but it can also include partial fasts from a particular item, as well as from other practices that draw us away and dull our spiritual sensitivity.
- 2. Fasting is more than skipping a meal and should be <u>planned and prepared for</u>. For those with no fasting experience, plan your fast to be no longer than one 24 hour period (two meals).
- 3. Anyone with medical issues should check with their doctor prior to fasting.
- 4. Identify a reason or purpose for your fast, perhaps a need in your life, a struggle you need to get through, a action you need to take, for God to move in an area outside of your control, for greater vision, for wisdom, for relationships to heal, or for a greater awareness of God.
- 5. Our goal this journey is to fast for a 24 hour period from food and all drinks except water. An alternative would be to fast for a 12 hour period.
- 6. The 24 hour fast should start after dinner, fasting through breakfast and lunch, breaking the fast with dinner the next day.
- 7. The 12 hour fast should start right after breakfast, fasting through lunch, breaking the fast with dinner that same day.
- 8. Start your fast with prayer and be prepared to notice and record what you feel physically, emotionally and spiritually. There will be spiritual warfare, so be prepared. Ask God to give you the strength and to reveal Himself to you.
- During the time you would have prepared and eaten your meals, spend the time praying, reading or studying the Bible, focusing this time on God, not just going about your normal activities.

Julian of Norwich - "Prayer unites to the soul of God." 7

Dallas Willard – "Prayer is talking to God about what we are doing together...pray about what you are interested in and then the circle of our interests will grow in the largeness of God's love to what God is interested in." ⁸

William Carey –"Prayer – secret, fervent, believing prayer – lies at the root of all personal godliness." ⁹

Andrew Murray – "Prayer is not a monologue, but dialogue. Its most essential part is God's voice in response to mine. Listening to God's voice is the secret of the assurance that He will listen to mine." ¹⁰

Curtis Mitchell – "Prayer is not conquering God's reluctance but laying hold of His willingness. God never needs to be made willing to grant the request. Persistence in prayer is not to make God more like man, but man more like God." ¹¹

Jesus - "You may ask for anything in my name and I will do it." John 14:14

The disciples never asked Jesus to teach them anything, except how to pray.

Richard Foster – "We should never make prayer too complicated. An inner sense of compassion is one of the clearest indications from the Lord that this is a prayer project for you." ¹²

Frank Laubach – "...live so as if you see anybody it will be to pray." ¹³ Invite Jesus to walk with you and touch those around you with his love and compassion. Throw a cloak prayer around anyone in our nearness.

C.S. Lewis - "We must lay before Him what is in us, not what ought to be in us" 14

John Ortberg – "Desperate people pray...people in foxholes pray...when we reach the limit of our resources we pray instinctively...Desperation prayers have been the beginning of spiritual life for many people. But, they are not sufficient to sustain it." ¹⁵

The Bible - Prayer changes things. The enemy would rather we do anything but pray.

Pray without ceasing - I Thess. 5: 17

Pray about everything - Phil. 4: 6

Dallas Willard – "Fasting confirms our utter dependence upon God by finding in Him a sustenance beyond food. Through it we learn by experience that God's word to us is a life substance, that it is not food alone that gives life, but the words that proceed out of the mouth of God." ¹⁶

Richard Foster – "Fasting must forever center on God. More than any other discipline, fasting reveals the things that control us. We cover up what is inside us with food and other good things, but in fasting these things surface." ¹⁷

David - "I humbled my soul with fasting." Psalms 69: 10

Fasting will most often be accompanied by spiritual warfare requiring the use of all the weapons of Ephesians 6.

Dallas Willard – "Fasting frees us from having to have what we want. We learn to remain calm, serene, and strong when we are deprived. Positively we learn that God meets our needs in His own ways." ¹⁸

Fasting will bring us out of the domination of desire.

Andrew Murray - "Fasting helps to express, to deepen, and to confirm the resolution that we are ready to sacrifice anything - to sacrifice ourselves - to attain what we seek for the kingdom of God." 19

In God's Word fasting is connected with a very troubled spirit or a very anxious heart. In a sense, it's not something you choose, so much as something that chooses you, because it's that important.

The early church expected those who fast to give away what they would have eaten, either in money or in food, to those in need, and even praised those who fasted in order to give to the poor.

John Wesley - "Is not the neglect of this plain duty (I mean fasting, ranked by our Lord with almsgiving and prayer) one general occasion of deadness among Christians?" ²⁰

Martin Luther - "He wants nothing at all to do with you if by your fasting you court Him as if you were a great saint, and yet meanwhile nurse a grudge or anger against your neighbor." ²¹

2.4 God Shopping

You can find five major Worldviews in societies around the world. These have been with human culture over time and often are repackaged in modern wrappings. There really is **nothing new** under the sun. For a more in depth look at these, please review the <u>More Cool Stuff</u> in this lesson.

Atheism and Naturalism: There are many flavors of this NonGod but they all stem from the belief that Man, Matter and the Physical universe are all there is. There are no moral absolutes, so values and evil are relative to the person. There is no God, no miracles, in fact man created the idea of God. Nothing exists after death, there is no purpose in living.

Post Modernisim: This is a worldview skeptical of absolute truths or universal principles in favor of relativity and individual experience. Buzzwords include multiculturalism, tolerance, and inclusion. All religions are true and all cultures are equal.

Pantheism: This is a belief in an infinite God that is everything and that everything is God. Our purpose is to be reabsorbed into the great spirit world of nothingness. Evil as well as the physical world is an illiusion.

Polytheism: This is the belief in many finite gods each with its own domain both within and beyond the physical world. One gains favor with these Gods by offering sacrifices and performing rituals, and visiting their human priests or practitioners, shamans, or witch doctors.

Theism: This is the belief in an infinite, personal God, who exists in and beyond the universe. Evil is a result of free choice and will be defeated by God. Miracles are possible and ethics and values are absolute and grounded in God. The human body and soul are eternal and live beyond death.

Every ism, philosophy, religion, worldview, personal outlook, is some flavor or variation or combination of these five. There are some basic similarities to all of these – they all strive to answer the basic questions of our heart.

2.5 The Big Six

There is a progression of questions, a simple decision tree, which reveals insight into the thought process we go through in forming our Worldview. Based on our choices, our worldviews, and our responses to the Proof of Life we have each experienced and observed, we can logically think almost all the way to the One and Only.

Question 1: Is it possible to know whether God exists or not?

No – stop here, you are an **Agnostic** (you either don't know, or believe you can't know) **Yes** – Please continue

Question 2: Do you believe in God?

No – stop here, you are an **Atheist** (A Skeptic would doubt God exists) **Yes** – Please continue

Question 3: Do you believe in One God or many gods?

Many – Stop here, you are a **Polytheist** (Animism, Spiritism, Wicca, etc.) **One** – You are a Monotheist, please continue

Question 4: Is the One God you believe in Transcendent (Greater than and Beyond Creation) or Immanent (within or equal to creation)?

Immanent – Stop here, you are Pantheist (Hinduism, Taoism, Zen Buddhism, etc.)

Transcendent - Continue

Question 5: Does the One and Only Transcendent God interact with His creation?

No - Stop Here, You are a **Deist**Yes - You are a **Theist** - Please continue

Question 6: Does the Theist God exist as one person or three persons in One?

One – You are a **Unitarian** (Judaism, Islam, etc.)

Three Persons in One - You believe in the Trinity of the Christian God

It is possible to answer the first 5 questions based on the many ways God has revealed Himself to us. This **general revelation** has been available from the beginning of time. But God knew it could only begin our journey to Him.

We will discover in upcoming journey units additional ways He interacted specifically with us, revealing even more about who He is.......Then we can answer Question 6.

2.6 Simply Mindboggling

God is a **simple** Being – the simplest of all. How can that be? Because He is pure being, without any potential existing in the eternal present, nothing needs to be actualized or effected by someone else. (Explain that in your own words.) God is being, everything else has being. He does not become, He is.

Or you could say, God is **self existent**. He was not made and had no origin. The I AM who I AM exists in the past, present, and future all at the same time.

Self Sufficient is another word that comes to mind. God needs nothing outside Himself. Only God can fully trust in His own self, All others must trust in God. He has life in Himself. He does not need our help, support, or defense.

This allows Him to be **independent** and **free**, unlimited by anything, His creation cannot affect Him in any way. This is the quality man seeks to gain when we put ourselves ahead of God. He is free from the effects of matter, space, time, and motion.

He is the only truly **necessary** being. All other things are dependent on God for life or existence. God is dependent on nothing.

There are no parts to God. He is **indivisible**, not a composition. He can't be torn apart. We on the other hand are made up of body, soul, spirit, intelligence, mind, imagination, and memory.



God is **One**. He is unique and perfect. There is only One God – more than one God would require limits on all of them. To have more than one God would mean there were no Gods at all.

One of the most passionate areas of belief throughout time has to do with exclusivity

- Is there only One God and if there is, is there only one way to Him?
- Can't I just be sincere about what I believe?
- Perhaps there are different names for the same God?
- Perhaps there are different ways to the same God?

Every major religion in the world today asks its followers for sincerity and exclusivity. Their way is the only way. All others are to be excluded or converted. It is only when we get to the Post Modern mindset of pluralism and tolerance that the ruckus escalates.

Truth by definition will exclude. Choices abound.....choose carefully. Mindboggling....

Besides Judy Garland and Israel Kamakawiwo'ole who has surged to the top of the charts with an updated lyrical ukulele version, this timeless song has been sung and arranged for and by every generation since, including arrangements by the Cast of Glee, Frank Sinatra, Eva Cassidy, Jason Castro and Katharine McPhee of American Idol fame, little Connie Talbot on Britain's Got Talent, Jewel, Tony Bennett, Ella Fitzgerald, Rufus Wainright and Barbra Streisand to name a few.

Worldviews

If someone asked you about your Worldview you might have to think twice.

Most of us have never really even thought about it.

Is it something we just make up as we go along? Does it matter in my daily life? Can I change it if I don't like it? Is this just an academic exercise?



Does it have anything to do with our race, sex, national heritage, current nationality or even our religion?

Everyone has a personal worldview much like every culture and society displays shared philosophies, values and customs. Sometimes the personal clashes with the cultural, and sometimes cultures allow multiple worldviews to exist and oftentimes these will clash and compete with each other.

What is a Worldview?

Simply put, it is a **theory of the world used for living in the world, a comprehensive system of beliefs about what exists, how things happen, and what it all means.** It serves as a foundation for all our thoughts, decisions and actions and spans a wide range of beliefs and topics.

Some of the questions and beliefs included in a worldview include:

- Why are we here? What is our purpose? Where did we come from?
- How did the world get here and how does it work?
- Where are we heading?
- What is culture? Are all cultures on an equal standing or are some better than others?
- Life is basically decisions we make about using our time. What are your priorities?
- Is life just about matter and energy or is there more?
- Can we know if God exists? Does God exist? What is He like? What is His relationship with the Universe?
- Did miracles occur in the past? Do they occur today?
- Is the universe self-assembling or did God create it in miraculous ways?
- Does God communicate with us in everyday life? Does He communicate through written revelation?
- What is God's role in history? Is there purpose and meaning in history for individuals and mankind? Is history linear or cyclical?
- How do we relate to each other? How are individual people regarded in contrast to the group/majority/culture/state?
- Is life important? What happens after death?
- What is wrong with the world? How can we fix it?
- What values and ethics are important? (How we should behave and what we should do and what methods are allowed)
- Who decides? Who gets power and how do they get it? Is power granted or taken?

Personal Worldview

On a personal level this is the **combination of all you believe to be true and what you believe is the driving force behind every emotion, decision and action.** It affects your response to every area of life and the society you live in including the following areas: Philosophy, Science, Theology, Anthropology, Economics, Law, Politics, Art, and Social Order.

It will also affect your beliefs about: death, work, sex, family, use of technology, the environment, life and health, recreation, rule of law, suffering, war, privacy, human rights and truth.

A worldview not only contains beliefs and values that are time honored and practiced, but also those that are withheld. It includes not only the things we do and love but those we won't or don't do and hate.

Where does your worldview come from?

Initially our worldview comes from the family we are born into. **Tradition and home are the two most powerful magnets for our worldviews.** Over time we often forget the original reasons for them, accepting them without question. No one asks Why?

Our early life experiences, religious training, family situation, education, national culture and customs will help determine our worldview. As we grow we have access to more outside influences than ever before from entertainment, sports, education, family, church, technology, work, relationships, and we learn if our worldview holds up to the reality of our life experiences.

Sometimes we change it just to be cool. Sometimes we change it because it makes sense at the time, it's what everyone else is doing. Young people often change out of rebellion. Others may change out of anger, or as a result of a traumatic experience. Some change because they obtain more truth, some because their current one isn't working or doesn't mesh with reality.

But many don't even know, don't care and are just getting on with it. And that in a nutshell is their worldview. No one is asking why? Nothing is critically examined.

Cultural or Societal Worldview

Personal worldviews operate within the context of a culture or society's shared philosophies, values and customs. These components allow a society to exist over time on a large scale and determines government styles, economics, education, family structure, laws, rights of citizens, power structure, care of the weaker members, methods of control, methods of security and protection of sovereignty, role of media and the press, protection of life and the role of religion.

Many societal worldviews allow for of the existence of a variety of personal worldviews under their governing umbrella so long as these personal worldviews do not threaten the society and culture. Problems arise when there are differences that cannot be overlooked or accommodated on either side.

Evolving Worldviews

Over time both personal and cultural/societal worldviews change or evolve. Sometimes this is the result of changes in the society that force the worldview to change, and sometimes the peoples' worldviews change first which forces the society to change.

Some of the reasons a society or nation's worldview would change over time include the following:

- Current worldview was **unsustainable**, implosion of society creates vacuum, new worldview accompanies power used to control crisis.
- **Advancement of society** through technology, discovery of new worlds, discovery of new knowledge, etc., creates tension in areas of ethics and values
- Generational gap inability of prior generations to pass on to future generations, different life experiences in successive generations
- Syncretism Multiculturalism equalizes beliefs and practices that dilute strength of ruling worldviews
- Media of all kinds controls information to fulfill agendas and change minds. Use of propaganda and misinformation or denial to all facts in order to change truth in minds of populace.
- Acceptance over time of values of personal peace and prosperity above all, apathy in general allows strong men to take over and control
- **Migration and immigration**, people groups from different worldviews, cultures and religions move into area and do not assimilate.
- Conquest by foreign nation bringing its own worldview
- **Revolution** from within, either societal morals, values or governmental coup.
- Religion, Science, and Education brings new ideas, new discoveries, new truth
- **Subtle manipulation** over time, bullying, shaming, violence, going along to get along, peace at all costs.
- Observation of past results, consequences, failures

Personal worldviews also change over time as people grow up, get an education, have their own family, accumulate life experiences good and bad, come to know God, deal with health and financial issues, and have a greater awareness of the world. They begin to ask Why?, critically examining the truth in their beliefs.

Major World Views

Hopefully, the chart below allows you to see the differences between the major worldviews that have been around from ancient times. We will discuss some of them in more depth but since it is a broad overview you are encouraged to do further in depth study if you desire more information.



Atheistic Worldviews

Believing in God is oftentimes considered something for the **uneducated and uninformed** when it is actually the other way around. As societies advance they begin to depend more on themselves, seeing no need for God, pointing to their own accomplishments as proof of their abilities.

But since the **Proof of God** is all around us, as we advance, we actually acquire better tools for discovering that proof.

Man, in his denial of the existence of God, has developed many flavors of Atheism, some of which are listed below. **See if you recognize** any of these in our society today.



- **Secular Humanism** man is the measure of all things, we are self-sufficient and will figure it out, will solve all our problems
- Rationalism If I can't understand it it doesn't exist. Senses can't be trusted, only reasoning, logic, and real world experience.
- **Naturalism** –nature is all there is no supernatural intervention in the world, only believe what can be felt with 5 senses or proved scientifically
- Materialism existence is explainable solely in material terms, with no accounting of spirit or consciousness. The universe as a huge device held together by pieces of matter functioning in subjection to naturalistic laws. Denies all concepts of Special Creation, it relies on the Theory of Evolution to explain itself.
- Nihilism there is no meaning or purpose in existence, no absolute value or truth we create our own value
- Marxism/Communism utopia can be obtained if everyone works for the good purpose of the whole. "From each according to his ability, to each according to his needs."
- **Pragmatism** Something is true if it works. Ends justify the means.
- **Secularism** no faith, no soul, religious skepticism or indifference. The view that religious considerations should be excluded from civil affairs or public education separation of church and state.
- Rationalism Everything we know by faith can also be proved by reason but not vice a versa. Deny creation out of nothing and divinity of Christ.
- **Scientism** Scientific method and proof is the only way to discover truth. Determines in advance kinds of conclusions and beliefs will be deemed acceptable.
- **Hedonism** Everyone does their own thing ultimate chaos.
- **Absolute Democracy** Absolute 51% vote, whatever the majority wants, no values or ethics, law and morals a matter of averages.
- Multiculturalism no truth transcends culture, no idea or moral concept might be true for
 every cultural group or every human being. All cultures, from that of a spirits-worshiping tribe
 to that of an advanced industrial civilization, are equal in value.
- Pluralism Every religion is true.
- **Relativism** No criteria by which one can determine which religion is true or best. Whatever you believe is true for you.
- **Universalism** Everyone will eventually be saved and go to heaven through good's eventual triumph over evil.
- Inclusivism One religion is explicitly true while all others are implicitly true.
- **Syncretism** Adoption of parts of one religious belief into another. The Romans were masters of this they used it to keep their empire happy and under control.

The Modernists vs. The Post Modernists

Postmodernism is currently a very influential worldview that appeared in the late 1960's and came into its own in the early 2000's. To understand it better we need to also understand the worldview it is a reaction against, Modernism.

The following lists compare the two competing groups.

Modernism was birthed during the Enlightenment (1700's) and is based on the humanistic ideas that man is good and has no need for God or outside revelation to survive and progress.

- Human reason alone is enough and will solve all the world's problems.
- Rational, logical scientific method defines all truth.
- Progress, technology, mastery of nature, and scientific advancement are highly valued.
- Reality or truth is what you can see and touch and prove.
- Cause and effect is what drives the universe.
- Personal peace and prosperity become man's goals.
- Ultimately leads to rise of technological advancement at any cost, rise of materialism and determinism, empty lives, pessimism and lack of creativity and beauty, loss of freedom, and elite amassing wealth and control.

Post-Modernism is a reaction against the pessimism and emptiness of Modernism and attempts to expose autonomous human reason as a dead end. It believes humans are only an extension of their culture not individual rational selves.

- Skeptical of absolute truths or universal principles in favor of relativity and individual experience. By acknowledging that anything goes, if you think it's true it's true, it fluctuates between atheistic tenets and at best polytheistic ideas.
- Truth is subjective at best, experiential and may change, individual perception is not reality. Truth is created as you experience it.
- Post Modern reality is subject to individual interpretation, which can change by the minute. All meaning is relative to a cultural situation. Personal choice legitimizes everything.
- Buzzwords include tolerance, inclusion, freedom of expression, and a refusal to claim to ever have all the answers or absolute truth. No single answer will suffice for all cultures or individuals.
- People who claim absolute truth are considered aggressors and repressive.
- Hedonistic everyone can do what they want when they want to.
- All beliefs are valid, but if you reject my beliefs, you reject me.
- Freedom from restraints of rationality, nothing separates truth from self-delusion, not responsible for choices.
- Truth is replaced by empowering political narratives, creating revisionist history, and celebrating multiculturalism.
- Easily able to substitute power for truth, use of sociological law, whatever society wants at the moment
- No common definitions, no moral restraints, freedom is only limited by freedom of another or their willingness to fight.
- Attracted to spiritual experiences, New Age, Mysticism, Wicca, Environmentalism, emotional responsiveness to storytelling, visual media, and modern mythmaking.

- Uncertainty
- Lack of absolutes
- Progress is unlikely

Paganism vs. Neopaganism

Paganism is a term originally used to **define beliefs that were not Christian, Jewish or Islamic**. These early religions were mostly pantheistic, polytheistic or animistic. The Greeks and Romans were considered pagan because of their polytheistic mythical superhuman gods and goddesses.

Neo Paganism comprises a **mixture of various modern beliefs and spiritual practices based on ancient pagan rites and rituals**, most often centering around the earth or nature, the sacredness of the land, and breaking through into the spiritual worlds.

Beliefs and practices range from modern day New Age and Wicca, to adaptions of ancient Druidism, Celtic, Norse, Roman, Greek and Egyptian polytheism. A Pantheon of gods and goddesses of all types are created and worshiped. Humans can also become their own gods and goddesses and communicate with the spirit world.

History is usually viewed as cyclical in nature, seasonal, with no end in sight, absolute truth does not exist, and all beliefs are true. Humans are not the crown of creation, the community is the most important, and the earth is greater still.

What's the difference between a Deist and a Theist?

This is another issue that gets a lot of press and can be very confusing.

Let's start out with what they agree on:

- Both Believe in One, Infinite, Personal god so we can call them Monotheistic
- Both Believe that God created the world
- Both Believe there are absolute moral values

Here are the major differences:

- A Deist believes God does not interact (miracles) with His creation and the universe. After He created it, He left it to itself and does not intervene. A Theist believes God exists and interacts within and beyond His creation and that **miracles** happen.
- A Deist does not believe in original sin while a Theist does.
- A Deist believes evil can be defeated (by man or God), while a Theist believes evil is a result
 of free choice and will ultimately be defeated by God.
- A Deist believes God's only revelation is through creation, not through Jesus or the Word of God, The Bible, as the Theist believes.
- A Deist places a high value on **reason** and the results of reasoning instead of faith.

What is a Biblical or Christian Worldview?

A Biblical Worldview goes beyond holding Biblical morals, or living life with Bible verses attached. It is not Christian political reactionism, but instead is **Biblically grounded transformation that goes beyond the spiritual, impacting anything and everything, inserting itself onto the world stage of life and culture**. Defined by hope in Jesus it moves beyond simple wishful or positive thinking.

Here are just some of the building block beliefs of a Christian Worldview:

- 1. An **absolute personal God** exists who created the universe out of nothing and then created mankind in His image, HE is worthy of respect, honor and worship.
- 2. He is the absolute **LORD** and King over this world.
- 3. He is **knowable**, but to think wrongly about Him is idolatry. He is also **incomprehensible** and infinitely greater than mankind.
- 4. Man has been given dominion over creation by God.
- 5. **Man is fallen, sinful**. Man is also a moral being made in God's image with free will and loved by God. Life is precious and begins in the womb.
- 6. **Government** is instituted to control fallen man with just laws based on Divine and Natural Law.
- 7. **Jesus, the Son of God, is also God**, and is mankind's only hope for redemption.
- 8. The Bible is God's instructions to man, absolute moral truth to be obeyed.
- 9. **History is linear,** not cyclical. It is made up of sequential events leading to fulfillment of God's purposes for humanity. Human history will climax on earth where it began.
- 10. **God provides** for His creation and we are to care for each other including the sick, the elderly, the poor and the young.
- 11. Satan and evil are real. Heaven and Hell are real. There is life after death.
- 12. **Sex** is good in the context of a **covenant marriage** between a man and a woman. All other expression is sinful and distorted and produces negative consequences.
- 13. We are to live in and **care for God's creation** carefully and lovingly, but it is not to be worshiped in HIS place.
- 14. **Technology is a tool** to be used to fulfill God's purposes but it is not to be worshiped allowing it to control us. This would include the use of and its exposure to media, recreation, communication, and information.
- 15. **Arts and Recreation** are a legitimate part of human creativity and community as long as they are used in a healthy and God honoring way.
- 16. **Work** is a gift of God and is to be pursued with excellence for God's glory. Our gifts and abilities come from God, as does prosperity or suffering and struggle.
- 17. Values **economic stewardship** of property, free enterprise, checking injustice and responsibility
- 18. Values political concepts of justice, freedom, order and limited government.
- 19. Through **education** we are to develop critical skills of analysis so we are informed, intentional and reflective about what we see, say and create.

Battle of the World Views

Christianity was born into the **worldview of the Roman Empire**. Rome was a glittering empire with a rotten core. Human life had no value. Ideas were considered the true reality as the spiritual was superior to the physical.

Every element of Roman society reflected this hierarchy of the superior ruling the inferior. The father ruled the family, men ruled over women, slaves were inferior to free, in fact they were considered to be tools. The emperor ruled and was to be worshiped as god by the empire.

Life had no value. Men fought to the death in the arenas, abortion and infanticide was common, visibly deformed children were left to die, and slavery was the economic foundation of the empire.

Multiple gods were worshiped and many were adopted from cultures of the people that were conquered by the empire. These gods were eternal, but really only super humans.

As the **Christian worldview expanded** after being legalized and then adopted by the Emperor Constantine, the following changes began to appear in the 300's and following centuries.

- People were equal, no one superior, since they were all created in the image of God.
- Opposition rose toward the institution of slavery, babies began to be rescued, the sick and weak were cared for.
- Since God created and worked, all people were now expected to work, whether it was intellectual or physical. Labor has intrinsic value, it's not just for slaves and servants.
- Technology began to be developed to remove drudgery from work. Property rights were developed.
- The ongoing dynamic between the church and the state began as Christianity became legal, but it did not depend upon the state, remembering its beginnings as a persecuted minority religion.

During the **Middle Ages** the ideas of Augustine and Aristotle regarding the **purpose and necessity of government** in any society were rediscovered. Augustine believed human government is needed because of sin, selfishness and self-interest. The absence of government equals anarchy. Government, run by sinful man, is corrupt by nature, but a necessary evil.

Aristotle recognized that government is a necessary institution that God has placed in the world and has positive and legitimate functions. The need was to find a way to prevent original sin from corrupting government.

John Locke's ideas of inalienable rights stem from the Middle Ages – Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness, based on belief that all are created in the image of God and have natural rights the state cannot remove. **Natural laws are the moral laws** God wove into the fabric of the universe. **Truth** is considered absolute, knowable to the human mind, and necessary for society.

However, the Christian worldview was always under attack from opposing worldviews that rose within various cultures and societies.

• The **Reformation Wars** of 1400-1600 were over not if Christianity is true, but which Christianity is true? Who were the true Jesus followers? Questions of the role of religion in society arose.

- The **Discovery of the New World** called into question Biblical morality and history. Where did these new people groups who don't know the gospel come from? Are they really going to hell because they don't know about Christianity? What about the story of Noah?
- Biblical authority was even further questioned and under attack as a new way to look at knowledge, the scientific method, becomes only way to evaluate truth. Truth moved away from certainty to probability. Knowledge moved away from studying classics to scientific experimentation. Evolution became the reason for God's creative power. Truth is now found in the present and the future, not in the past.
- As the modern western world moved through periods of Existentialism, Postmodern Nihilism, Eastern Pantheistic Neo Paganism, New Age, Materialism, and all flavors of Atheism, we have lost the certainty and meaning of life.

And once again it seems we have **returned to Roman times**. Materialism and evolution have led to feelings of life's purposelessness ushering in a rejection of spirituality. Today's supreme virtue has become toleration, after all, it's what kept the empire together, embracing any and all lifestyles. And if you don't go along to get along you are persecuted.

The decadent, oversexed, self-indulgent, anti-natal society that was Rome has returned in modern trappings as Western society today **continues this battle between Rome and Christianity**. Take away Christianity, and we're back to Roman pagan worldview.

- **5. We want God to be** everything else but God. Holding an incorrect view of God is a choice. It will determine our actions and our future.
- **6.** There is only One God more than one God would require limits on all of them.

We have come to the end of **The One & Only**, the second of the 12 Omniallinfinitude[™] Journeys. This journey has caused us to **Remember** "God said to Moses, "I AM WHO I AM" (Exodus 3:14a) and **Read** Joshua 1 & 24 and Hebrews 11-12.

We **Analyzed** with Chapter Titles and Key Words and **Investigated** the One & Only, as well as **Practiced** Prayer and Fasting. We also took **Inventory** of our Wants and Needs and went on an **Adventuring** Prayerwalk. We were challenged by the revelations in the **More Cool Stuff** Worldview chart, and then again by the definitions of so many flavors of Atheism. And finally, **Lyrics** spoke to our hearts and souls as we pondered the One & Only through music.

The **Journal** guided us through discovering **how our actions and choices reveal what we put our faith in.** We are constantly **looking for answers** to those basic questions placed deep in our souls to draw us to HIM. Inorder to survive, we **create a framework** to make sense of life and the world – **our Worldview** – which provides these answers.

However, when we make ourselves the determiner of Truth instead of the One & Only, we create a myriad of isms, religions and worldviews. But since there is **nothing new under the sun**, our God shopping results in one of **5 major Worldviews**: Atheism/Naturalism, Post Modernism, Polytheism, Pantheism and Theism. By answering **6 basic questions** we are able to determine what we currently believe about God.

We learned God is **simply mindboggling** – so **simple**, pure and **indivisible**. He is truly **free** and **independent**, needing nothing outside Himself – truly **self sufficient**. He is also **self–existent**, has always been and is currently in what we perceive as the past, present, and future, all at once. He **needs nothing** and no one, yet everything and everyone needs and is dependent on Him. He is **One** and **the Only One**. There are no other Gods.

Now it's time to **think back** over this part of your journey and **reflect** on what you have discovered and learned. The categories below may help jog your memory. **Describe** the details of any areas that **apply** to you.

about the journeys...

Welcome to **Omniallinfinitude**™.. a series of guided journeys leading to greater knowledge and understanding of the attributes of God and the Spiritual Practices necessary to gain this knowledge.

The only requirement is a willingness to learn and discover through a variety of activities. Some elements you may naturally be drawn to, some will challenge you, and some may be way out of the box for you. It is important to do them all, in order, completing one journey before moving on to the next.

There are twelve journeys or units, **each designed to be completed in two months** - either by yourself, with a friend or in a small group setting. It is important to remember we all start from different places, we start with what we know and move on from there, but we are all traveling together.

journey elements

The following elements make up each journey and should be completed in order. Some of the elements require some advance planning, so you might want to review the entire contents of each journey before you begin. Use the Table of Contents to check off your progress.

Remember: One or more Bible verses to memorize for each journey unit.

Read: Throughout the twelve journey units you will read some of the most profound and well loved chapters in the Bible.

Analyze: A variety of Bible Study methods will be offered to help you analyze in greater depth a section of the Reading above. The goal of this section is to familiarize you with various ways to greater understand God's Word.

Investigate and 10 things: Each journey unit focuses on a group of God's attributes, defining terms, and completing a directed investigation page.

Practice and Why?: Part of growing in our relationship with God is the intentional practice of skills that have helped Christians from the beginning. Each journey unit will focus on one or more of these with instructions for developing each discipline skill. Some Practices involve doing a specific activity, while others require we stop doing certain things.

Inventory: A personal inventory will be completed regarding areas related to the attributes and skills studied in each unit, reviewing your personal history and evaluating your current practices and beliefs.

Adventuring: This section guides you to venture out into the world with a specific assignment to observe, interact with or impact your surroundings and neighborhoods. The intent is to allow God to reveal Himself through nature, media and other people.

Lyrics: You are encouraged to read the included song lyrics as poetry for your inspiration, go online and listen to the actual recordings and then reflect on the questions that follow.

Journal and More Cool Stuff: The author has included some musings and further information pertaining to the subject of each journey unit for your consideration, personal response and reflection.

Closure: At the conclusion of each journey there is a place to recap where you've been, what you learned, new thoughts, challenges, growing pains.....

about remembering...



Think of this exercise as a necessary foundation for future excellence – like practicing scales on the piano or doing wind sprints or swimming laps, taking your vitamins, or eating your vegetables.

We actually recall or remember all kinds of things we've memorized without really even trying. Can you think of any?

How about your phone number, email address, street address, zip code, social security number, birthday, names of your family, how to get to work, how to drive a car, that secret recipe....or how to spell or multiply, song lyrics, movie scenes, jokes, what someone was wearing, what car they drove, sports statistics, what chocolate tastes like, what the ocean smells like, and on and on.

Why do we remember what we remember?

Recollection is just the tip of the memory iceberg. Within our marvelous and mysterious brain the memory works in collaboration with us and the world – it uses all our senses and emotions. We associate smells, colors, places, rituals, symbols, landmarks, even people, with memories and when we sense the trigger, we remember.

There are tremendous spiritual benefits from Remembering Bible verses:

- Strengthens our faith
- Shapes how we view the world
- Makes God's Word immediately accessible
- Guards our minds......and that's just for starters.

Experts say that we will forget more in the first hour after our memory event than in one day, and more in the first day than the first month...What we remember for one month, will probably stay with us.....so the idea is to remember regularly for one month and we've got it.

Here are some suggestions to help you get started. We all learn differently – so don't be afraid to try some of the more unusual methods. Not only do we need to remember the verse, **we need to remember to work on remembering the verse**.

- Write the verse on several post it notes or index cards and put them where you will see them such
 as the car, the bathroom mirror, the kitchen sink, a bulletin board, your computer screen saver,
 your cell phone, by your bed.....
- Make plans to spend five minutes, twice a day (usually as you get up and before bed) to review.
- Say it slowly, 15 times in a row, emphasizing each word.
- If you have already learned it in another translation, review that one. Once you know it in one, look it up in a couple of other translations to see what is different.
- Review it when you are waiting in line, or on hold on the phone.
- Sing it make up a tune to go with it
- For extra credit, add the verse before and the verse after.

about the practices...

The Spiritual Practices put us in a place where we are better able to interact with our environment and God. God can then reach inside our spirits and transform them.

Just as our body needs to eat, breathe, exercise, drink, sleep, etc., so our spiritual self needs to make sure it is being sustained, cared for, and trained.

The results include spiritual growth, a life controlled by the Holy Spirit, evidence of the fruit of the spirit, and the ultimate goal, living life like Jesus did.

The Spiritual Practices are not:

- Meritorious laws that earn favor with God
- A way to show how spiritually mature we are
- Unpleasant or difficult

Instead, they are:

- Intentional
- Activities we do that when practiced allow us to do activities we cannot now do.
- Adaptable to work with our temperaments and gifts
- Adjustable according to the rhythm and seasons of our lives

There are two kinds

Practices of Abstinence - when we stop doing something that is perfectly normal to allow ourselves to focus more on God, His Word, and growing in godliness. These also help us resist our tendency toward sins of commission (when we do something we shouldn't do). We withdraw to breathe in all that God can provide to us, breaking the hold that the world has on our lives. Practices of Abstinence help ready us and create room for the Practices of Engagement.

Practices of Engagement – when we do certain activities that help us grow in Christ and obey his commandments. The Practices of Abstinence have opened up the time and broken up the preoccupations so we are now free to learn of, focus on, and practice those things that God commands us to do. These assist in keeping us from our tendency toward sins of omission (not doing the things we should do). We engage to breathe out all that God commands us. ¹¹

As their name implies, the Spiritual Practices are not one-time events, but skills to be learned and developed over time. So don't be discouraged in the beginning if you struggle with them or find them difficult. Make them a regular part of your life. In our Journeys we would rather **emphasize the actual practicing of the Practices** and not so much the reading about them.....and let you discover the benefits as they appear in your life.
